# A. H. WESSNER COLLECTION Donated to MHS

The Manchester Historical Society recently received a significant gift of important historical objects, photos, and documents from the estate of Albert H. Wessner of Manchester. The gift came through his niece and executor Lisa Wessner, who is the current secretary of the MHS Board of Directors.

According to curator Shawn Harrington, this is the largest gift of Manchester memorabilia since its founding in 1897. "Not since the Harris C. Whipple Collection was donated by his brother John Whipple in 1960 has such a significant assemblage of artifacts, ephemera, photographs and documents been gifted to MHS."

His (Herb's) lifelong dream was to share that history with people through exhibitions and community gatherings.





#### **Exceptional Service Awards**

#### Longtime Contributors Honored

The MHS Board of Directors inaugurated the Exceptional Service Award in 2017 to permanently acknowledge supporters who deserve public recognition for their contributions to the preservation of Manchester's history. On December 11, two longtime contributors were honored as this year's recipients, architect Bill Badger and former curator Wesley Hill.

Bill has been the quiet force behind the Manchester Historical Society for several decades. A graduate of Dartmouth and the University of Pennsylvania Graduate School of Fine Arts, he returned to Vermont to raise a family and set up practice as an architect with a special interest in historic preservation. His love of history led him to begin a long relationship with the Manchester Historical Society.

Over the years his quiet determination and persistent dedication to MHS have kept it humming. Though he emphasizes that his role was one of bringing people together, he also served in several different capacities including president. In addition to MHS, Bill has given generously of his time to other local nonprofits boards over the years including the Manchester Community Land Trust, Riley Rink at Hunter Park, the Northshire Courthouse Preservation Committee, and the Bromley Outing Club. His passion for railroads led him to become one of the founders of the Rutland Railroad Historical Society.

Wes was born in Manchester, his family having arrived in 1913. Wes graduated from Burr and Burton Seminary (now Academy) in 1982 and went to work for the Orvis Company in 1994. His great friend, the late Herbie Wessner, got him hooked on Manchester history in 1995 and he has been studying it ever since. Wes is an amazing repository of all kinds of local historical knowledge. With his marvelous memory, he has been a solid

source of names, places, and relationships in Manchester's history. He is generous with his knowledge and ready to respond to all who need his help finding some fact, no matter how arcane, and has devoted many hours in recent years to helping MHS catalogue the collection and sort out the larger items that are currently stored in a local barn. He was also an enormous help moving the collection from the Mark Skinner Library to the Manchester Community Library in 2014. Wes is still working for the Orvis Company where, in addition to his regular duties, he volunteers his time to assure the history of the company is preserved.

MHS is deeply indebted to both of our honorees for their remarkable support for the Manchester Historical Society.

A legacy gift allows us to support MHS after our lifetime in a way that may not have been possible through lifetime gifts.



The simplest way to plan a legacy gift is by including a bequest in your will or living trust. Gifts of retirement plan assets (IRAs) or of life insurance proceeds are also good opportunities for this "planned" gift.

Present and future generations owe a debt of gratitude to Lisa for her long and careful consideration of her uncle's legacy."

MHS looks forward to sharing more about the new additions to the collection with the community in the near future.



#### IN MEMORIAM

#### **BOB FOWLER (1923-2018)**

MHS lost a great friend last September. Bob Fowler was a beloved Manchester community member who gave his time and energy to numerous nonprofit organizations.

Robert P. Fowler was born August 30, 1923, in Manchester, the fourth son of Earle Fowler and Helen Read. He lived for many years in the family home on Highland Avenue and graduated from Burr and Burton Seminary (now Academy) in 1943. Bob married Ruth Stone, a fellow graduate of Burr and Burton, in 1944, and they raised two children in Manchester. He worked as a farmer before becoming Manchester's postman. In 1952 Bob became president of the newly revitalized Manchester Historical Society and was president for a decade. He remained an active member until he moved to Bradford, VT, in 1996. Bob loved collecting historical artifacts and made generous gifts over the years to MHS as well as Burr and Burton. He is survived by his wife Ruth and their two children Roger Fowler and Trudy Fowler-Fadden, four grandchildren and two-great-grandchildren.
